The one I am eager to read is Wilmington's Lie: The Murderous Coup of 1898 and the Rise of White Supremacy by David Zucchino -- just published this year.

The Good Book commands us to be doers and not just hearers of the Word, so our learning and understanding must always follow with action and solidarity.

I hope you will join me in praying for both justice and peace and the burning conviction that we are all equally God's children.
