Statement of PurposeLynette Hawkins and Margaret Arbuckle

One hundred fifty years ago, several African American enslaved members of First Presbyterian Church who were emancipated as a result of the Civil War, left First Presbyterian Church and founded their own church, Saint James Presbyterian Church.

We gather today to celebrate where God has led these congregations and their ministry over the years and to offer our Confession of Sin for these years of racism and separation of God's people, to seek forgiveness from God, to seek repentance and create reconciliation among our peoples and to Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.

Leader: O God, to remember our sins, to confess, to lament and to repent, requires that we trust the promise of your love, grace, and mercy.

Fortify our trust.

People: Great is thy faithfulness. Your mercy is new every morning.

(Lamentations 3:22)

Leader: Today as God's people we listen to God's biblical call to remember.

Just as Israel remembered their past enslavement in Egypt, today we remember and lament that our brothers and sisters in Christ were enslaved by their fellow members of First Presbyterian Church.

People: Lord, call us to remember.

Leader: In response to God's vision of liberation, in 1867, freed men and

women departed from First Presbyterian to serve God in freedom. Their departure gave birth to Saint James Presbyterian Church.

People: We remember that you call us to be one church. Our congregations

were once one body. Yet the body suffered. If one member suffers,

all suffer together with it. (1 Corinthians 12:26)

Leader: You call us to love our neighbor as ourselves. Lead us in the way of repentance and forgiveness.

People: May your Spirit overpower our caution with courage and love. (2 Timothy 1:7)

Leader: We lament that this community was divided by racial inequality since its inception. We lament the pain still inflicted by injustice. We confess that we are part of a world where people are judged by the color of their skin instead of the content of their character. We lament that in our world the sins of white supremacy and racial prejudice distort your divine plan for our human lives. We confess that we are hemmed in by dividing walls of hostility.

People: We confess that in the cause of racial injustice we have been too slow to act, too indifferent to take a stand, too numb to feel the pain of others. We confess that we have not always lived up to your call to be ambassadors of love and justice. Yet you, O God, are able to break down the dividing wall of hostility. (Ephesians 2:14 and 2 Corinthians 5:20:7)

Leader: What does the Lord require of you?

People: To do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with God. (Micah 6:8)

Leader: O God, make us people of justice. May we seek a world that decreases in harm and abounds in equity and fairness.

People: May we know that peace is not the absence of tension but the presence of justice. (Jeremiah 6:14)

Leader: O God, make us merciful unto ourselves and unto one another as we stumble along the path towards reconciliation.

People: May we truly love our neighbor as ourselves. (Mark 12:31)

Leader: O God, make us humble in navigating between justice and mercy. Make us humble in listening to one another's lives.

People: Forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may ever hereafter serve and please you in newness of life, to the honor and glory of your Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

People: In Jesus Christ, we are forgiven. Hallelujah! Amen.




WE HEAR GOD'S WORD

WELCOME YOU to the worship of God as a joint community of faith. One in Christ, we unite this morning to celebrate the 150th anniversary of Saint James' founding.

IF YOU ARE A VISITOR, we encourage you to wear a name tag, included in your bulletin this morning, and also available in the blue Welcome notebooks on your pew.

VISITORS AND MEMBERS, please sign the attendance pad in the Welcome notebooks. We care about how folks are doing and try to pay attention when our members haven't worshiped with us in a while. And please note the names of others on your pew and say "Hello!"

FAMILIES can find comfortable seating, a nursing screen, and a live feed of the service in the Myers Loyalty Room behind the Sanctuary. Parents must supervise children.

IF YOU HAVE CHILDREN, we offer ways to make worship meaningful for them. Children in second grade and up are encouraged to participate with the congregation in the full service. Children age three and under may enjoy the nursery. Children are also encouraged to lead in worship by being acolytes and lay readers, and by joining our children's choirs. Sign up for the children's e-news to learn about various opportunities for your child, and the whole family, to get involved in worship.

Nursery care is provided for infants through age 4 on the **first floor of Mullin Life Center**. Our Child Protection Policy helps ensure our care is safe, loving and appropriate.

Children in Worship bags: Children are invited to participate in worship by using the worship bags with new activities, located in the Tower Room, narthex, and Greene Street entrances. Please return bags to any of these locations at the end of the service.

Worship Enrichment is our children's worship time during the sermon for four-year-olds through first grade. Children will return to the service during the Hymn of Response.

Restrooms, including a family room, are located off the hallway behind the pulpit and chancel. We encourage young children to be accompanied by parents any time they leave the Sanctuary.

HERITAGE PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS the First Presbyterian Church of Greensboro, North Carolina was formed under the pastorate of Reverend William D. Paisley in 1824 by twelve founders, who were firmly committed to the Gospel of Christ Jesus; and

WHEREAS four of those original founding members were enslaved persons: Tony Paisley, Milly Paisley, Molly Paisley, and Kezia Carson; and

WHEREAS by April of 1859 the number of enslaved communicants at First Presbyterian Church had grown to fourteen plus Betsy Mitchell, a "Free" person of African descent; and

WHEREAS between April 1859 and November 1866 another 23 enslaved persons were baptized or admitted into the community and fellowship of First Presbyterian Church; and

WHEREAS at the end of the Civil War and with the emancipation of all enslaved persons, all the former enslaved members of First Presbyterian Church except Sibby Moderwell withdrew from the congregation and in 1867 founded the Saint James Presbyterian Church in Greensboro: and

WHEREAS on this 150th anniversary of Saint James Presbyterian Church, the Session of First Presbyterian Church is pleased and humbled to acknowledge, claim and celebrate our common roots and heritage with Saint James Presbyterian Church, not only in the worship of Jesus Christ, but also in the church history that we share; and

WHEREAS as to those former enslaved members and bold pilgrims into their new faith community, we venerate and honor their strength and courage, their determination and remarkable grit, their purpose and steadfastness, their vision and confidence, their dignity and resilience, as well as their faith, hope, and abiding trust.

NOW THEREFORE with gratitude abounding, the Session of First Presbyterian Church, Greensboro, North Carolina, does hereby embrace, rejoice in, and proclaim for all the world to know now and for all time that we are, and have since our beginnings been, joined together in history, fellowship, and in service to the Kingdom of God with our full brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus at Saint James Presbyterian Church, Greensboro, North Carolina, and celebrate with them our joint heritage. To God be all honor, praise and glory!
