Your love has been, and continues to be, so evident as we navigate Dolly's death, Covid's latest resurgence, a new school year fraught with anxiety, and so much more. When I allow myself to stop and take it all in, I marvel at what we've weathered already and worry about those desperately in need of relief. I also give thanks for the countless people in our midst steadfastly caring, praying, helping, and serving.

We are the Body of Christ in the world and we've no shortage of work to do in His name. God's enlisting us to participate in the present and coming kingdom of heaven, while challenging, is also an incredible gift that offers joy, purpose, and hope. Please keep them in prayer as they begin their work.

We are diligently working to make sure the excellent pastoral care that Dolly led for many years continues smoothly. Our parish associates, Newton Cowan, Doug McLeroy, and Maria Hanlin are committed to doing what needs to be done, as is our Pastoral Care Committee. We will update you on leadership as soon as we are able.

As we wrestle with many challenges not of our choosing or our making, now is an opportune time to assess our priorities and core values. What really matters? What really does not matter? We've been broken open and in that breaking the light of Christ shines through, heals and leads us forward. I pray you will consider how you can continue to be connected, or reconnect, to our church family. We're asking you to boomerang back to church whether that be through participating in worship more frequently, in-person or online, joining a Bible study or small group, praying regularly for our congregation, or supporting our outreach ministries. God has called us together to share the good news of great joy for all people and many need to hear that living Word right now.

COVID GUIDELINES APPROVED THIS WEEK

So that we can remain open safely:

Worship

- Sanctuary service continues and Rejoice! will begin September 12, with no signup needed.
- Masking required
- Hand sanitizers used upon entry and exit
- Appropriate distancing maintained
- Overflow spaces available for the Sanctuary service; livestream continues
- Weddings and funerals will follow the same guidelines as worship services.

- Church School classes and small groups may meet inside, masks required
- Masks enouraged but not required for outdoor meetings
- Food and drink permitted at outdoor gatherings
- Hot Dish & Hope continues to-go meals
