Mission and vision statements can be helpful, but only if they are useful, only if they are enacted. Perhaps you have a personal one. Perhaps you are familiar with those of organizations with which you are affiliated. Maybe you, like me, have put much effort into creating a mission and vision statement, only to forget about it until it feels like it might be time for a new one. Given that we're on the cusp of our 200th, and given that we're on the other side of a pandemic, and given that we've had much change in leadership — well, it felt like time to reconsider our congregation's mission and vision. Hence, all of those small groups, shifting through every response, writing and rewriting, conversation, discussion, wordsmithing, much prayer, a little weeping and gnashing of teeth. After all of that process, here's where the Session landed (at least for now!):

Rooted and reaching in Christ's love, we will serve God as Spirit-led changemakers for good.

Our vision is to be a caring, compassionate, and inclusive faith community welcoming those who seek

an abundant relationship with Jesus Christ meaningful worship authentic connections lifelong learning transformative service

We are continually growing and evolving, even as we remain strongly rooted in the Greensboro community and the Presbyterian tradition.

Come as you are and prepare to be transformed by God's love.

All of this is based on Ephesians 3:17b-18, verses that emphasize the expansiveness of God's love revealed in Christ. If you remember nothing else about this process, the statement, the words, remember this promise and truth of God's abiding, abundant love. It is this truth, when we even begin to grasp it, that will transform us, our actions, our priorities, our perceptions, everything, and we then, in turn, will begin to participate in God's transformation of the world, for good.

I've been reading a lot about strategy, most of it written for the corporate world. Some of it applicable to the church, much of it not so much. But the following concept from an article in the Harvard Business Review concisely articulates what I hope our mission and vision statement encompasses. James Collins and Jerry Porras write, "Core purpose is an organization's most fundamental reason for being." I pray our core purpose for being here at FPC Greensboro is to demonstrate the love of God made known to and for the world in Jesus Christ. I pray everything we do, indeed who we are to our core, reflects that saving, embodied, expansive, powerful love. So, yes, please, let's learn our mission and vision statement, but, more importantly, let's live it.

in the MISSIONS meaningful worship

Jim and Paula Hoeger and family exemplify intergenerational connection with meaningful worship that many members rely on in good times and bad. Despite his own storms of faith, Jim returned to the church, committed to worship, while Paula experienced the blessing of pastoral care during her health challenges. Both return God's love through participation as lay readers and ushers, as well as service work alongside their daughter Catherine Freeze. authentic connections



Authentic connections form the foundation of FPC. In discussing this pillar long-time FPC member and Discipleship Committee member Nancy Courts raised the question, "What is authentic connection?" Perhaps it's best exemplified in the genuine caring offered and trustfully received between each of us. From our encounters within FPC whether as a potential new member, or as members receiving pastoral care, participants in service or worship, or in

study groups, this is often the signal quality of our connections.

Elder John Vanderwerff remarked that among his many connections within the life of our church – from participating in youth programs 30 years ago, during his service ministry, to his role now as an elder – one of his favorite moments of authentic connection was serving as elder during the baptism of Rev. Rachel Fitch's new son Isaac. As the congregation watched the sacrament of baptism their faces testified to that connection.

Lifelong learning stands as an integral part of Presbyterian faith. Great teachers and library resources are central to that part of FPC. From our wealth of knowledgeable pastors and teachers past and present to the sound library at FPC we are well-served. With Nancy Fuller at the helm our library stands ready to support every aspect of Christian learning from our youngest to advanced scholars among us. Check our library bulletin board or participate in the book clubs to know spiritual enrichment. Or slip into a class led by Dr. Sandie Gravett or Dr. Jerry Beavers and be enthralled and more connected to the rich heritage of the Bible and

Christianity.

If wrestling with contemporary issues stirs you, seek out adult Sunday School leaders Jack and Betsy Harrington. They remain committed to the role of learning in our faith journey. Betsy notes, "It's the deep experience of talking about important issues together, seeking more questions than answers, that is so meaningful." Jack reflects on especially in the Wednesday Men's Bible study, "The journey of conversations with others, the honest give and take, these are the gifts of participation in the life of our church." He enjoys that these men are committed to meet if in town, to "be there" for each other.

transformative service

Transformative service remains the root most visible to greater Greensboro. From the Wednesday Drive-by canned food collection to Neil's Meals and other services we have an amazing hunger ministry. Chief among these is Hot Dish & Hope, chaired by the capable Camille Townsend. Many of those already mentioned here as well as volunteers from other faith groups in Greensboro serve hundreds monthly on Tuesdays and Thursdays in Mullin Life Center through Hot Dish. Not surprisingly this need led to the issue of what else can be done about hunger in our community.

Sheron Sumner, who started Hot Dish, wrestled with this issue. In answer she replicated Raleigh's StepUp program in Greensboro. Nancy Godwin, now StepUp Greensboro board chair, sees the program empowering people to make better life choices, supported in their journey to jobs and a better life, which transforms not only the lives of those they serve but also hers. Martha Turner's inspiration in working with StepUp is witnessing people overcome horrendous challenges when StepUp transforms lives as part of God's love.

Hot Dish volunteer Zelle Jester tells how she and her late husband John served in the early years of this ministry. As he was failing but still an engaging talker they set out to "jaw jack" people who might be going hungry and entice them inside. One woman they befriended, Miss Betty Patterson, began praying for John. When he passed five years later, Miss Betty was still praying for him. Their friendship endures. Zelle says, "It's lopsided: Those who are serving get more than those they serve. It's not a secret!"

Rooted at FPC, reaching at the U.N.

Hi First Pres! Greetings from a New York humid enough to give Greensboro a run for its money! I'm finishing the last of my two (technically three, online in 2020), YAV years, at the Presbyterian Ministry at the United Nations, and it's been a sprint to the end.

We hosted a youth group from our Salem Presbytery siblings at Alamance Pres, followed by a visit from PCUSA's mission coworkers in South Sudan, Nancy and Shelvis Smith-Mathers. They met with the U.S. mission among others to discuss the humanitarian crisis and how to meet urgent relief needs for civilians fleeing the violence.

On one of my last days our office took part in an interfaith service at the Church Center of the U.N. commemorating the 70th anniversary of the Korean Armistice and focused on rededicating ourselves to the work of peace. This event was months in the making, and I was honored to help plan it.


We hosted folks from divided families who fled the North and 70 years later remain separated. We also had representatives from Canada, Switzerland, Sweden, New Zealand, the Holy See, Kiribati, and the United Kingdom, along with UN officials. Presbyterians, Episcopalians, Methodists, Mennonites, Buddhists, and Quakers led us in prayer and reflection. It was a beautiful, moving service, and the epitome of the type of ministry we as Presbyterians engage in within the UN context.

My time as a YAV would not have been possible without the support, encouragement, and love of my FPC family. This church has seen me through every year of my life so far, and whether I'm in Scotland serving as a YAV, representing PCUSA in Montreal at the UN biodiversity conference, or engaging the UN community through ecumenical advocacy as a YAV in New York, I know that I can always turn to my community at home in FPC.

A personal highlight for me occurred this past February, when I had the opportunity to travel back to Greensboro with Rev. Jimmie Hawkins, the head of the PCUSA advocacy offices in Washington, DC, and New York City. I got to see so many familiar faces, share the work that our offices do, and introduce my boss to my home faith community. In these three

years filled with many unforgettable experiences, the feeling of being in the same sanctuary and Life Center I sat in as a kid, this time in front with a microphone, looking at the same smiling faces that have loved on me my whole life, tops them all.

Although my time as a YAV is done, my advocacy journey and faith journey are not. In late August I will begin a full-time position in the Mennonite Central Committee's UN office as an Advocacy Associate (only three floors from the PCUSA office!). I will also continue to serve on PCUSA's Advocacy Committee for Women and Gender Justice, on the board of Presbyterian Women, and from afar on FPC's Racial Equity Task Force.

My advocacy and faith journeys began at FPC, and I know as I embark on this next step, I carry y'all with me every step of the way.

Purity now lives in Kernersville. After a visit home, she began hearing God's call to give back to her home country and founded Sister2Sister in 2010. She started a program at an elementary school that serves a hot lunch to almost 200 children daily. A Children's Home opened in Ngong this past December with 12 teenage girls and their 9 babies living there now. Knowing their babies are cared for by a matron and staff, the girls are able to complete their schooling and learn skills such as knitting and sewing. Praying and worshiping together daily, they find hope and encouragement as they realize their God-given potential.



Meg Peery McLaughlin! Meg, with her husband Jarrett, are co-pastors of University Presbyterian Church in Chapel Hill. Never heard of married copastors? Neither had anyone else,

viewpoint, Meg will be the keynote speaker at the FPC Women's Retreat at Grandover Resort January 27-28.

It wasn't a surprise that Meg went into ministry. Both her parents are ordained as are her brother and his wife. She and Jarrett earned two master's degrees at Union Presbyterian Seminary. They have shared the leadership at University Pres since 2019. Says colleague Mindy Douglas of FPC-Durham, They "have been leaders in the denomination from the beginning of their careers."

"I know of other co-clergy couples," says Meg, but they serve in different areas with one as a pastor and one as, for example, a Christian educator or counselor.

"Co-pastoring with your spouse is not for everyone," Meg says. "We aren't turfy, we complement each other, we communicate well, and we're open to help and coaching."

It's not without problems. For

example, who sits with the kids

– Naomi and twins Caroline and
Zanna – when Mom and Dad are
leading the service? The girls are old
enough now to sit on the front row
with oversight by congregational
friends – and the occasional
meaningful glance from a parent.

When asked about women in ministry in general, Meg notes that the old model measured women against how a man would do it. More recently, the special ways and gifts women naturally bring to the table are more valued. Still, women clergy are not paid as well and fill more associate than lead pastor positions. There are still gender expectations, such as when someone

under Jarrett's direct supervision charged with fluffing the church parlor came to Meg to ask about getting the drapes cleaned. There is also the ingrained expectation that the mom is the default parent, the one who manages the kids' schedules, books the babysitter, buys the shoes. Meg stresses that Jarrett is an excellent parent; it's just that there's a different load for women. And let's not forget navigating boundaries and being mindful of sexual harassment, from which the PC(USA) is not exempt. Overall, Meg notes in a wise observation, there is "what you see plus what you don't see" that women clergy carry on their shoulders.

This idea of seen and unseen issues is one of the reasons women's retreats are valuable. Meg has many good memories of these gatherings, including the time she and her mother (an ordained minister who has spent her career in Christian counseling) led a retreat together. She recalls an older retreat attendee who had recently moved to town and the church. Her husband had Alzheimer's, and time away was rare for her. She was a bit quiet and watchful, gathering her impression of this community. When her husband was hospitalized then passed, it was the retreat women who rallied around her. This illustrated to Meg that retreats help the church for more than that weekend; they offer more connection than just an hour on Sunday. They provide a framework to form the warp and weft of the church's fabric. Plus, she adds, "taking a break with women of your faith and your church is refreshing and wonderful."

Julie Wade, who is co-chairing FPC's retreat with Nancy Abrams, believes that women of all ages and stages will relate to Meg. "She is both witty and wise, plus has a prayerfully considered message to bring to the women of FPC," Julie says. "I can't wait to hear it!"

SHETLER DISCERNMENT PROJECT UPDATE

A team from DHIC, a non-profit developer of affordable housing based in Raleigh, has been in conversation with our Property Committee. DHIC is proposing replacing the Shetler with a new structure that could provide about 40 apartments for affordable housing for seniors. This requires a property survey, which is in process. Results will be shared with DHIC, and we will learn more about options and possibilities. Should this move forward, the apartments would be managed by an experienced and trusted non-profit. We are early in the process but please be in prayer. The congregation will be kept informed as these conversations continue.

PROPERTY UPDATES

With proceeds from the sale of the Greene Street properties, these repairs and updates have been completed:

- The wrinkled carpet in the Life Center circulation gallery has been replaced with carpet squares.
- The rubber treads on the Tower Room steps has been replaced.
- The boiler room chimney was cleaned of waste accumulated from birds flying in and out. New screening will keep birds out going forward.
- The Old Presbyterian Graveyard saw some trees removed and the repair of an obelisk damaged last fall by the remnants of Hurricane Ian.

Also, exterior rails and light posts have been painted, covered in the 2023 budget.
