During this Lenten season our focus will be on God's actions. The lectionary texts appointed for the Sundays of Lent, 2025 revealed to us during our staff planning retreat the reality that God is in fact always doing a new and good thing. We can be confident that no matter what is going on in the world or in our world, the Spirit is interceding on our behalf and surely, ultimately, God's plans will be accomplished. Nonetheless, with our limited human understanding life often feels chaotic, challenging, and downright scary. We won't shy away from being honest about our experiences as we navigate our attempts to follow Jesus, carry the cross, and lose our lives for the sake of the gospel. Gratefully, the biblical record also reveals that we never need to hold anything back from our Maker.

As part of that Lenten planning retreat our program staff did an exercise in discerning what we believe the core values of our congregation are. (Our newly

elected class of elders will be doing this at their retreat, too.) Here are the values that together we thought to be core for our church:

Believing days: Having the eyes to see God's presence



Sheron Sumner sparked hands-on outreach at FPC

It has been a truly frigid winter this year. Emerging from it perhaps we can appreciate what having a warm place to stay, a hot meal with friendly spirits and the anticipation of a brighter spring might mean to someone cold, hungry, unhoused or jobless.

These issues crush the spirit of even the most faithful Christian. As FPC celebrates its 200th

Coming to FPC in the mid-1970's Sheron found community with other young families. Along with a career both in academia at UNCG, as well as director of Cancer Studies at UNC-Chapel Hill and of Community Education at Women's Hospital and Cone Health, and in non-profits like the United Way and Southeast United Dairy Association, Sheron was recognized by the governor as a member of the Order of the Long Leaf Pine.

Along the way as an active FPC member she has been a vital impetus to many outreach initiatives coming out of our church.

Neil Dunnavant, former Outreach pastor , remembers that the congregation at the time was, in the main, giving its support through donations to worthy causes and serving on boards throughout the community. But the spirit of the times was shifting and the church with it. People were ready and beginning to think in terms of what hands-on work they could contribute as well. The elements of a warm blaze of Christian love were present, only a good spark was needed. That spark was Sheron Sumner.

"FPC needed someone with her powerful blend of energy, faith, passion and compassion," Neil said. "She is visionary and so talented." Sheron connected the community's needs with the willing spirits and ready hands of other FPC members.

Based on what she had seen of a program in Raleigh while visiting her son, she began Hot Dish & Hope in September 2011 with help from

other members, particularly Cheryl Crago. The program now provides meals twice weekly to those who need them in the Mullin Life Center. Sheron also helped start the Winter Emergency Shelter for the unhoused on a seasonal basis, taking in some of the overflow from Greensboro Urban Ministry.

Out of Hot Dish & Hope and the Winter Emergency Shelter in Greensboro a new program arose: StepUp Greensboro. Working within the Greensboro community Sheron met Anthony Bass through Urban Ministry. He helped form StepUp and came to lead it. More than simply a jobs program, it aims to transform unemployed, "unemployable" people into stable, capable and dependable citizens who can proudly step up into a place within our community. StepUp now operates out of our Shetler Building.

As observed in an article about Sheron in the News & Record, "She is tireless, driven, visionary and selfless, the kind of leader to whom people naturally gravitate."

Sheron has found these activities make a big difference in her life and she says they are essential for happiness. She sees how the people involved have grown in faith; how personal sacrifice has helped form community within the church and in Greensboro itself. She is grateful for all and points out,


