Time to take on the task

A short, but thick with thought book I revisit regularly is by Hugh Heclo, *On Thinking Institutionally*. Heclo makes a strong case for the role of institutions, institutions like churches, in shaping society for good over the long haul. He argues that to "think institutionally" is to think beyond ourselves and thus to make decisions that are not solely self-serving, but instead for the benefit of a larger purpose that lasts well beyond our lifetimes. In a section I find especially resonate he writes:

"...institutional thinking understands itself to be in a position of receiving rather than of inventing or creating. The emphasis is not on thinking up things for yourself, but on thoughtfully taking delivery of and using what has been handed down to you. In taking delivery, institutionalists see themselves as debtors who owe something, not creditors to whom something is owed."

Heclo goes on to quote Goethe, "What you have received as heritage, take now as task and thus you will make it your own."

It seems to me we are at a point in the life of our congregation where we are being called to task. After nearly two hundred years of serving this community those of us occupying the offices of teaching elder and ruling elder, member and, most importantly, disciple, are indebted to all the saints who came before us. We have taken delivery of our magnificent sanctuary, the excellent preschool, the life-giving ministries Hot Dish & Hope and StepUp. We've been entrusted with the organ, our residency program. We've been taught in Sunday School, seen our children mentored, and witnessed our parents visited, and celebrated. All of this, and so much more, we received. Now it is our task to steward this heritage, and in so doing, perhaps not so much make it our own, but shape it in ways that further God's mission in our time and for future generations.

This year marks a pivotal season in our life together. As we celebrate our 200th anniversary beginning in October and continuing until May of 2025, we also embark on an over \$11 million capital campaign, and continue to explore what God is calling us to do on the corner of Fisher and Elm. I pray through the power of the Holy Spirit we will be strong and courageous, taking what we received as task, all of it God's own, stewarding everything in ways that reveal of the life, love and character of Jesus Christ.

During this season of Lent, I invite you to wonder what God is doing with us, through us, among us, for us and, yes, to us, knowing we can never repay the debt Jesus paid on our behalf, but in joyous, grateful response, we can take up the task to which we've been called for such a time as this.

The Interfaith Affordable Housing Initiative (IAHI) is a group of faith communities who have organized to address the challenges of affordable housing in Greensboro. Currently there are 12 faith communities, including FPC, involved with IAHI. The Working Group gathers on the second Monday of each month at noon to connect, learn about what is going on in the community, and collaborate on affordable housing projects. IAHI has recently decided to form three committees to help focus their work:

- Building Projects Committee Seek opportunities for the IAHI to lead or participate in projects building additional affordable housing in our community.
- Family Support Committee Look for ways congregations can support families seeking to transition into or maintain safe and affordable housing.
- Advocacy Committee Keep participating congregations informed about opportunities to participate in advocacy efforts with the city, neighbors, or others to support efforts to increase affordable housing in our community.

Meet Phae Smith, our new Associate Director of Children's & Youth Ministry

What was your first youth mission trip or conference, and what do you remember about it?

Raleigh Youth Mission in seventh grade. I remember spending an hour sorting cucumbers for a local food bank. It amazed me how many hands were needed to provide food for the community. Even though my job seemed insignificant and tedious to my seventh-grade mind, I still remember that first love of service that was sparked in me while sorting through those veggies.
