Imagine a young girl singing in FPC'S choir who grows up to spread her abiding faith worldwide teaching and writing hymns.

Such a spirit of faith lives in Dr. Mary Louise Bringle, known to many as Mel.

Like a tree with deep roots and farreaching branches Mel manifests her extensive knowledge, understanding and talents in her works. You have seen this although you may not have known it; in every pew are copies of the Presbyterian hymnal we use, *Glory to God*. Mel chaired the Presbyterian Committee on



Congregational Song which brought this current version of the hymnal into being.


Her roots in

Greensboro began at age four when her parents Elizabeth and Emmett W. Bringle moved here. Her father, an elder, deacon and trustee, taught for 24 years in the Young Men's Bible Class. Emmett even served as chairman of the FPC 150th anniversary event. Mel recalls many family trips and meaningful devotions.

She tried out for the Children's Choir with the new choir master and organist, Frank Pethel, fresh out of Union. Mel felt an immediate bond with him because of a shared birthdate. Thus began her introduction to hymns and love of church music.

Graduating to the Junior Choir she learned about hymns and theological texts. Throughout her high school days, Guilford College years, study in France and later graduate work at Emory University, Mel continued her FPC connection.





MEL BRINGLE is a college professor, an award-winning hymnist and a Society of the US and Canada. She chaired the Presbyterian committee Glory to God hymnal – the image above marks the number of Mel's hyr committee. Before any of that, she was a member of FPC's Junior Choi circle). Mel will be with us in November as our 200th anniversary celeb

Mel has had an illustrious career teaching and writing. Currently Professor of Philosophy and Religious Studies and Coordinator of Integrated Studies Major at Brevard College, she HAS authored several scholarly books and writes awardwinning hymns. She previously served on the faculty at St. Andrews University in Laurinburg.

Her original texts as well as hymn translations are wide-ranging. Her relatively recent book, *Envy: Exposing the Secret Sin*, (Westminster John Knox Press, 2019) the third in a series of three explorations of cardinal sins, examines extensively the literary, artistic and moral philosophy revolving around this deadly sin for which the ancient cure reveals itself: gratitude.

She says, "I attended my first Hymn Society conference the summer I moved to Brevard. I wrote 'When Memory Fades' while staying in the guest house at the Brevard campus, while house-hunting."

Mel has served as President of the Hymn Society of the US and Canada and was named a Fellow. As Mel observes, "Fellows of the Hymn Society are composers, scholars, performers and practitioners in that world who I hold in the highest esteem."

Other favorites, "Jesus Comes," and "So Great a Love," were written with Sally Ann Morris.



Especially poignant is her hymn text "Light Dawns on a Weary World" one with which she is especially pleased, which she wrote in collaboration with music by William Rowan. Mel has also collaborated with David Partington.

Mel enjoys interaction with students as well as collaborating on hymns with her peers. She sees students inspired by the insights of Biblical texts as well as Christian authors like C.S. Lewis in "Dreaming of Heaven." Along with scholarly writing and hymn texts, Mel teaches not only Brevard students but also speaks at her church on many Sundays, a mark of their regard for her speaking.

We are thankful that Mel Bringle got her start here and honored that she returns to help us celebrate the church's 200th.

30 years of faithful teaching

Thirty years ago, the idea was to study books of the Bible thoroughly and for whatever time it took. Occasionally, the Seekers Class made it through only two or three verses in one Sunday School hour.

"We have wandered from that," reflects Gerard Davidson. "Now, the books come in no particular order, each one discussed until we're done."

A fine evolution for a course of study that suits the students, and the teacher, perfectly.

Gerard has been teaching on Sundays in the Seekers Class for his 30 years. The class recently celebrated the milestone with a dinner and a cake.

Over time, Gerard has developed a system. Starting six to eight weeks ahead, he'll spend about four hours

BY TAMARA SLAUGHTER FPC member researching. His go-to reference guides are the Interpreter's Bible and the New Revised Standard Version of

The New Oxford Annotated Bible, commentaries as available, plus reams of notebooks from previous lessons lining his bookshelves.

Most often, his lessons delve into a book of the Bible. A few digressions include The History of Christianity in America, a course on Predestination, and a study of Dietrich Bonhoeffer. The class also studied Christian Doctrine "until we couldn't take it anymore." Favorite books include Genesis-Exodus, John, Romans, and Acts.

"Acts is like a travelogue," Gerard says. "It's the bones on which the New Testament hangs." He includes images that put the writings into geographical,

historical, and theological context. The class follows Paul thru Asia Minor to Rome through maps, pictures of archaeological sites such as Ephesus, Phillipi, and others, and artwork exploring different portrayals of Paul.

Gerard also features artwork in Christmas and Easter studies. How artists depict the birth of Christ, the crucifixion, and the resurrection provides context and illustrates different schools of thought. For example, James Tissot's watercolor "What Our Saviour Saw from the Cross" leads to vibrant discussion.

These Seekers find ways to study despite challenges. An unexpected delay once led to Gerard teaching a class by phone from the car while his wife, Janet Ward Black, drove them home from out of town. During COVID, the class met by telephone conference call. Even then, his class was as always: thoughtful, thought-provoking, well-researched and interesting.


