

Although this hymn is often used on large and festive occasions, its first two stanzas had much humbler beginnings: they originated as a family table prayer during the Thirty Years' War (1618–1648). These words have been associated with this tune since the mid-17th century.



WE HEAR GOD'S WORD

THE WORD READ: Matthew 5:1-12


When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. Then he began to speak, and taught them, saying:



47% OF THE STUDENTS AT UNCG EXPERIENCE FOOD INSECURITY. The Outreach Committee decided that we could help through the university SAFE fund (Student Assistance Funds for Emergencies) which provides onetime assistance to matriculating students who experience short-term financial emergencies. These include medical care, loss of shelter, travel costs for family situations, and food insecurity. This immediate support provides the "safety net" students need to keep them on the path to graduation. Because of the generosity of the members of FPC to the Neil Dunnavant Hunger Ministries, our gift of \$40,000 will go toward food insecurity.
