It feels like 2024 is flying so we must be having fun! As you know, the Rooted & Reaching Capital Campaign kicked into high gear earlier this year. Meetings, lots of meetings, put plans in place for gatherings, communication, worship and more. The leadership team never failed to take on any and every task with enthusiasm and skill. Many of you responded to their calls, pledging, sharing your stories of your love for this church, volunteering to help in any way you could. I confess, when this process started over a year ago, I didn't think, "I can't wait to take on a capital campaign!" I knew we needed to do it. There are projects that cannot wait. I also knew marking our 200th with the funds needed to shore up our walls for our next hundred years of ministry made sense. What I didn't anticipate was the gift of so many conversations with so many of you throughout these past few months.

Whenever we got together, at church or in homes, the sense of connection and community was palpable. It was evident how much you enjoy being with one another, how much you care about each other. The gatherings were marked by laughter and heartfelt sharing. Unprompted, some of you told stories of just how much this church means to you and how committed you are to making sure our congregation thrives for the sake of future generations. I left every meeting encouraged and inspired.

While the most intense part of our Rooted & Reaching Capital Campaign is behind us, there is still much work to be done. The Project Review Committee is working diligently to plan the scope and sequence of the work to be done on our campus. The renovations will require moving our preschool, StepUp and Sunday school classes. No doubt, there will be times when we feel upended by all that needs to get done. However, I've no doubt that the same spirit of connection and commitment I witnessed these past few months will infuse the entire process.

I could not be more grateful to all of you who continue to serve Christ in this place with energy, intelligence, imagination, love, AND joy. I am excited to see what God will do next as we begin the projects funded by your generosity and we mark our 200th anniversary made possible through the faithfulness of those who came before us, the entirety of our life together held in Christ and upheld by the power of the Holy Spirit. Update on our Capital Campaign

When I was asked to be a part of our Capital Campaign at the end of last summer, knowing that we had a lofty goal of over \$ 11 million, it took much prayerful consideration before I could say yes. I came to the conclusion that while I'm not a practiced fund raiser, I do love this church. I also was reminded that

God knows what we need and he will provide.

I am pleased to announce that to date we have received over 340 pledges totaling more than \$10 million. We are now at 90% of our goal. Our congregation has achieved this in a little over four months with less than half the historic contributors participating. To that end, we have sent out 300 letters to those that have yet to pledge as a reminder that their support is still needed.

Our Lead Gifts team continues their efforts, staying in contact with potential large contributors. We are expecting totals to grow even more.

Where are we now?

As the Project Review Committee has been making plans, it appears that due to inflation with rising materials and labor costs, the total amount needed to achieve all campaign benchmarks will be greater than our established goal. The actual costs are still being determined and an accurate number is not available at this time. As mentioned earlier, while pledges and contributions continue to mount, we cannot confidently say that all aspects of the Benchmarks can be accomplished.

Going forward the Project Review Committee will be evaluating the benchmark projects and assessing incoming projects bids. Reports from that committee will be forthcoming in future Session meetings. Items not related to renovation projects are similarly being assessed to see how we can accomplish those aspirations. The Capital Campaign committee will also continue to update the Session and the congregation on pledge progress as we move into the fulfillment phase.

As a community in faith, we have accomplished a great thing raising an incredible amount of money in a very short span. I want to acknowledge Joel Mikell, our campaign consultant, for his guidance and encouragement throughout these past several months.

But even more important, I need to recognize all the hard work and dedication the entire Campaign Committee, Church Staff, and especially Jill have dedicated to this undertaking. It is their commitment that has achieved a great thing that will help to sustain these buildings and allow us to do Gods work in His house and into our community.

Historically, the definition of First Fruits is the initial results of an enterprise or endeavor. It is a symbol of our trust in God that He will provide. We celebrated the campaign's First Fruits in April, and we need to keep in mind that we as a congregation are achieving a monumental task of raising \$11 million. That is an achievement and a gift from God.

To paraphrase the beginning of Psalm 105:

"Give praise to the Lord, proclaim his name; make known among our FPC congregation what He has done."






